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MISSION STATEMENT

We inspire and empower our students to discover, to engage, and to imagine the limitless nature of themselves and the world.

THE SCHOOL

Fredericksburg Academy is a prekindergarten through twelfth grade, independent, nonsectarian, college-preparatory day school, with 122 students in the Upper School. Established in 1992, FA embraces the idea of continuous improvement. With its Honor Code as the foundation of the community, FA places a high priority on developing the qualities of integrity, leadership, responsibility, self-discipline, and respect for others. The Student Government has meaningful input in administrative decisions, defining and overseeing the daily life of the Upper School; the vast majority of activities are genuinely student-run. Fredericksburg Academy is accredited by the Virginia Association of Independent Schools and National Association for College Admission Counseling.

THE COMMUNITY

Located midway between Richmond, Virginia and Washington, D.C., and surrounded by highly-respected public and private colleges and universities, Fredericksburg is fast-growing city with a deep-rooted past—think George Washington's home and major Civil War engagements. Fredericksburg encompasses the diversity of the country racially, socioeconomically, and politically like few other independent school communities. FA offers the only independent educational opportunity within a 45-mile radius.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM AND CURRICULUM

Fredericksburg Academy is a school where students develop mastery of not only the foundational academic skills of analysis, argumentation, and calculation, but also the increasingly important technology-driven skills such as compilation, evaluation, and synthesis of information, as well as collaboration and communication. Through a learning philosophy that stresses the acquisition and implementation of a wide range of enduring skills, FA provides a time-tested and relevant education, positioning its students for success in college and in life. **Note: The Integrated Science I and II sequence combines full-year courses in physics, chemistry, and biology.**

MINIMUM GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Students take a minimum of five one-credit courses each year. Graduation requires a minimum of 21 credits.

EXHIBIT

Exhibit is a two-year program in which students design and direct their learning. Starting in tenth grade, each student identifies an area of interest through self-assessment and guided reflection. They spend 30 hours on the Learning Activity, exploring their topic in depth. They then put their learning into practice by completing the 30-hour Application. The experience culminates in the eleventh grade with a formal presentation and Q&A with teachers and peers, where students share what they learned about their topic and themselves. Throughout the process, each participant receives feedback from the Exhibit Coordinators but ultimately is responsible for the successes and failures of their project, developing initiative, confidence, and independence that carry into college and beyond.

SCHOOL, CURRICULAR, AND CLASS OF 2026 DISTINCTIONS

- There are 32 students in the class of 2026. With such a small cohort, the school has chosen not to rank its students.
- Over \$2.85 million in financial assistance, which includes merit awards, were distributed in 2025.
- FA is accredited by the Virginia Association of Independent Schools (VAIS) and a member of NAIS and NACAC.
- The school does not give annual, individual academic awards.
- FA does not participate in any national honor societies.
- 7:1 student to faculty ratio. 85% of faculty hold advanced degrees in their fields of expertise.

GPA AND GRADING POLICY

- GPA is based on a 4 point scale (A+ is NOT 4.3) and calculated for all Upper School credit-earning courses.
- Weight (0.25) is earned for Honors and Advanced courses. Weight (0.50) is earned for AP courses.
- Transcripts for courses taken at other schools are sent to colleges in support of a student’s application but are not included on the FA transcript or used in the GPA calculation.
- For Exhibit, students earn Pass with Honors (PH), Pass (PS), or Fail (F). Pass with Honors is reserved for work at the highest level and is awarded sparingly.
- Grade inflation is rampant due largely to the intense pressure schools face to boost the academic standing of their students. The push to get an edge in the college admission process can be overwhelming. As a college preparatory institution, FA’s purpose is to prepare its students for the demands of college classrooms in both the discussions and assessments, which includes ensuring grades are reflective of their readiness. FA has resisted the pressure to inflate grades, and our GPAs reflect this; we ask you to value and support this position.

G.O.A.T. - Coined and planned by students. **G**auntlet, a massive all-school relay race; **O**rientation, a collection of Student Government, Honor Council, and PARC presentations to set the tone for the year; **A**nd **T**ogetherness, a day of grade-level and FAmily games, we compete for fun and educate for community during the first week of school.

Reading Buddies - Over the course of their senior year, students develop relationships with first graders focused on mentorship and building a strong sense of school community. Through shared activities such as collaboratively writing spooky Halloween stories, dancing together in the first grade’s Rodeo Day, and building blanket forts and reading favorite children’s stories, the seniors help the first graders develop their creativity, confidence, and sense of belonging.

Community Meeting - Upper School begins each morning gathered in the Theater for a student-led meeting where students and faculty share daily announcements and student leadership groups share a bit of fun.
